Art in Medicine: Session 1

Visual Thinking Strategies

Our museums may be closed, but that doesn't mean we have to stop experiencing art together during this challenging time. Please join us on June 11 at noon to look deeply at a wondrous work of art online and experience art in community. This is the *experiential* session of two planned sessions on Art in Medicine.

Here's how Session 1 will work: Dr. Chisolm will choose a work of art and facilitate the discussion using Visual Thinking Strategies (VTS). All you have to do is join in. No additional preparation is required, but if you wish to read more about VTS ahead of time, Dr. Chisolm suggests the attached two papers. Following the VTS discussion, we will, as a group, reflect on two questions: 1) What does VTS ask of you? 2) How is VTS relevant to medicine?

Margaret “Meg” Chisolm, MD

Dr. Chisolm is a Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, as well as Medicine, at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. Dr. Chisolm has a BA in Visual Arts from the University of Maryland Baltimore County (UMBC), an MD from the University of Maryland School of Medicine, and did residency training in General Psychiatry at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. Board-certified in both general psychiatry and addiction medicine, Dr. Chisolm has nearly 3 decades of clinical experience in these fields. In addition, she has served as PI or co-investigator on multiple nationally funded research projects, and has published over 80 scientific, clinical, and medical education papers on psychiatric disorders and humanistic medical practice, as well as articles (and one book) on the use of social media in medicine, several book chapters, and a psychiatric textbook. She has provided mentorship to undergraduates, medical students, house staff, graduate students, fellows, as well as junior faculty in psychiatry, internal medicine, and other fields locally, nationally, and internationally. Dr. Chisolm completed the Harvard Macy Institute's Art Museum-based Health Professions Education Fellowship, where she is now on the faculty, in addition to being a certified facilitator in the best-studied art museum-based pedagogical method, Visual Thinking Strategies. Last year, with the support of the Paul McHugh Program for Human Flourishing, which she directs, Dr. Chisolm piloted a planned multi-week elective for Hopkins medical students at the Baltimore Museum of Art (BMA) focused on the 'big questions': what it means to be human, to be a physician, and to lead a good life (for doctors and patients). Given the pandemic, she recently adapted this course into an online elective for Hopkins medical students focused on professional identity formation. In addition, last semester she developed a series of grant-funded art museum-based sessions at the BMA for Hopkins pre-health students, and is developing a series of grant-funded CME session as well. Dr. Chisolm has also developed an app (Bedside Education in the Art of Medicine [BEAM]), which allows busy clinical teachers to use paintings and poems to reflect on the human experience of illness with their patients and learners in the hospital.
