

Advocacy

We stand with all children and families to advance an equitable quality of life for all within the hospital and community through advocacy, education and collaboration. For Pinellas County, our Community Benefit Service Area:

- **15.9** Black infant deaths per 1,000 births in Pinellas County. As the organizer for Healthy Start services specific to addressing disparities among the most vulnerable populations, we seek to improve outcomes for children from birth.
- **> 50%** of school-age children in our area are eligible for free or reduced school lunch. One in six live in homes with low food security, meaning they do not have enough food at times for an active, healthy life. To help fill this meal gap, the hospital participates in the Summer BreakSpot program to provide hot nutritious meals for students.
- **> 61%** of our patients are on Medicaid.
