

Johns Hopkins Medicine, headquartered in Baltimore, Maryland, is a \$6.5 billion integrated global health enterprise and one of the leading health care systems in the United States.

- Johns Hopkins Medicine, a non-profit, virtual enterprise, combines a 121-year commitment to community care with groundbreaking research, teaching and medical services to patients worldwide.
- The Johns Hopkins Hospital has been ranked number one in the nation for 21 consecutive years by *U.S. News & World Report*.
- Johns Hopkins scientists receive more federal research support annually (\$439 million) than counterparts in other U.S. medical schools.
- Johns Hopkins Professor Carol Greider, winner of the 2009 Nobel Prize for Physiology or Medicine, joins 19 other current or former School of Medicine scientists as Nobel laureates.
- Johns Hopkins School of Medicine and Health System employ more than 34,000 full-time faculty and staff, making them combined among Maryland's largest private employers and the largest in Baltimore City.
- Continuing its century-old commitment to serve and nurture its community, Johns Hopkins Medicine provided \$248 million in uncompensated care in 2009.
- Johns Hopkins Medicine International features hospital management, health care consulting and clinical education services through strategic alliances and affiliations in North America, Latin America, Europe, the Middle East and Asia.

Johns Hopkins Medicine operates six academic and community hospitals, four suburban health care and surgery centers, more than 30 primary health care outpatient sites; and has more than 2.6 million outpatient encounters.

Going Forward

- Johns Hopkins is nearing completion of a more than \$1 billion project—one of the largest hospital redevelopment efforts in U.S. history—to create an all-new Johns Hopkins Hospital in East Baltimore.
- Scheduled to open in 2012, the Sheikh Zayed Tower and The Charlotte R. Bloomberg Children's Center Tower will feature 560 private rooms, 33 new operating rooms and a mammoth emergency department.
- The Wilmer Eye Institute's \$105 million Robert H. and Clarice Smith Building and Maurice Bendann Surgical Pavilion, which opened in 2009, will provide surgery to 14,000 patients annually.
- The School of Medicine's new \$54.3 million, Anne and Mike Armstrong Medical Education Building, opened in 2009, offers state-of-the-art classrooms and labs to complement a new, groundbreaking curriculum, Genes to Society.
- The Science & Technology Park at Johns Hopkins project, now under construction, will provide 1.1 million square feet of lab and office space in East Baltimore. The research complex will house 30 to 50 companies.
