DIVISION OF HEMATOLOGY**

The Division of Adult Hematology at Johns Hopkins University is recruiting a tenure-track physician-scientist at the associate professor or professor level with interests in hematopoiesis, coagulation disorders, hemoglobinopathies, malignant lymphohematopoietic disorders, or other areas pertaining to hematologic research. Board certification in hematology is required. The candidate is expected to have a national reputation and to have independent funding for his/her research. Ample laboratory space and salary support from an endowed chair in the Division of Hematology will be provided. The Division of Adult Hematology, one of the few remaining free-standing hematology programs, has an 8 bed inpatient unit. The division performs 700 new hematology consults and sees 2500 outpatients a year. There is an outpatient sickle cell infusion clinic that is open 7 days a week and an anticoagulation clinic with more than 3500 visits a year. The Division also interacts closely with Hopkins Sidney Kimmel Comprehensive Cancer Center in the management of the inpatient hematologic malignancy services. The program also has a vibrant research-oriented hematology fellowship program with two training grants. Applicants should have experience in mentoring young investigators and building strong research collaborations.
