Postgraduate Critical Care Residency for Physician Assistants

Our mission is to provide an educational environment whereby the Certified Physician Assistant is trained to the highest level of proficiency and critical-thinking in the skills required to provide multi-disciplinary care to critically ill patients.

Training will be provided in the Intensive Care Units and affiliated departments of The Johns Hopkins Hospital and The Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center, and will include management of acutely or critically ill patients requiring intensive monitoring medical management. In this academic environment, Critical Care PA residents will collaborate with a team of practitioners to apply basic and advanced physiologic concepts and technology in an evidenced based practice. PA Residents will work with experienced PAs, Nurse Practitioners, Critical Care Medicine Fellows, Attending Physicians, and Anesthesiology and Surgical Residents. Throughout the year, the PA Resident will develop in their ability to be the primary provider for critically ill patients, present the patient to and determine the plan of care with the ICU team, and become proficient in the skills and procedures necessary for comprehensive management of critically ill patients.

Residency Description

Residents will rotate through any or all of the following Adult Intensive Care Units: Surgical (General Surgical, Neurosurgical, Cardiac), Burn, and Medical ICU. Additional time will be spent in the ED and on specialty services. Residents will rotate through both the academic tertiary care hospital (JHH) and academic community-based hospital (Bayview Medical Center). In doing so, they will care for patients following Neuro, Trauma, GI, Thoracic, Transplant, Vascular, Plastics, and Cardiac Surgery, as well as critically ill medical and burn patients.

Qualified applicants must meet the following:

- Graduate (or eligible for graduation) of an Accredited PA Program with a minimum GPA of 3.4
- Masters or Doctorate Degree or commensurate work experience
- Eligible to sit for PANCE by 9/30 or 1/30.
- Possess the desire to learn and be self-motivated
- Completed application process--application and fee, letters of recommendation, and personal essay



The Johns Hopkins Simulation Center is a state-of-the-art training facility now offering specialized instruction and training for residents, students, and staff.

Basic Education

- Faculty mentorship – residents will choose a faculty mentor with whom they will meet throughout the year.

Physician Assistant Critical Care Residents will follow the 7/1/2003 duty guidelines established by the Accreditation Counsel for Graduate Medical Education. Residents are limited to 80 hours a week (averaged over 4 weeks). Adequate time for rest and personal activities must be provided. This should consist of a 10 hour time period provided between all daily duty periods and after in-house call. They will leave by noon the day after call and will have one day off within every seven days. Meal coupons are provided when Physician Assistant Residents are on call.

A Certificate from Johns Hopkins Hospital will be awarded after successful completion of the twelve-month Postgraduate Critical Care Residency for Physician Assistants.
