1889

The Johns Hopkins Hospital opens under philanthropist Johns Hopkins' vision for a hospital linked with a medical school that is part of a university, all bearing his name.



1893

The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine admits its first class of 18 students, including three women (not pictured).



1964

Johns Hopkins Children's Center is established with the opening of the Children's Medical and Surgical Center.



1984

Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center, then known as Baltimore City Hospitals, is acquired.



1996

Johns Hopkins Medicine is formed, uniting the Johns Hopkins Health System with the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.



Johns Hopkins HealthCare, initially called Johns Hopkins Employer Health Programs, is formed.



Johns Hopkins Home Care Group, Inc. is formed as an umbrella corporation for multiple home-based services.



1986

The Wyman Park Health System is acquired, eventually adopting the name Johns Hopkins Community Physicians in 2003.



Howard County General Hospital in Columbia, Maryland, becomes a member of Johns Hopkins Medicine.



Johns Hopkins Medicine International is established as a global ambassador of the Johns Hopkins Medicine mission.



2009

Suburban Hospital in Bethesda, Maryland, becomes a member of Johns Hopkins Medicine.



Sibley Memorial Hospital in Washington, D.C., becomes a member of Johns Hopkins Medicine.



2011 All Children's Hospital in St. Petersburg, Florida, which is now known as Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital, becomes a member of Johns Hopkins Medicine. The name change took place in 2016 to reflect its academic role.
