U.S. News revises its methods every year, adding new measures while adjusting how much each contributes to the overall score. This year, U.S. News made many significant changes, transforming the way the Best Hospitals Honor Roll is computed. Two of these changes had a significant impact on The Johns Hopkins Hospital. One was the way points are calculated and allocated for each specialty. The other was the inclusion of hip and knee replacements, which are mostly performed at Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center.

As some of you know, we are still working with U.S. News to support the use of data that are relevant to Maryland hospitals and to continue to improve the rigor with which data are evaluated.

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U.S. News Changes Best Hospitals Honor Roll Methodology

U.S. News revises its Best Hospitals

methodology every year, adding new measures while adjusting how much each contributes to the overall score. This year, the organization made many significant changes, most notably, transforming the way the Honor Roll is computed. They included a new Honor Roll ranking formula, added the rating of nine common care conditions and procedures in the calculations, and adjusted weights for specialty scores. The graphic on this page helps explain the complex changes that have occurred in 2016.

"The methodology that U.S. News uses for its rankings will continue to change, but Johns Hopkins' commitment to delivering safe, quality patient care to every patient will not," notes Peter Pronovost, director of the Armstrong Institute for Patient Safety and Quality and senior vice president for patient safety and quality for Johns Hopkins Medicine. "We will treat all patients who need our care, without regard to how their conditions might affect third-party rankings. We will continue to challenge ourselves and find ways to make Johns Hopkins even better."

In an effort to create useful resources for consumers, quality experts from the Armstrong Institute are continuing to work closely with representatives from U.S. News and other public and private organizations to create better ratings that gauge the true quality of care provided by hospitals.

To determine a hospital's overall ranking, U.S. News first figures the individual specialty rankings for the 12 data-driven specialties and the four reputation-only specialties, as well as the ratings for nine conditions and procedures. After these rankings and ratings are calculated, points are assigned to each. These points are then totaled and ranked highest to lowest, with the hospital receiving the most points awarded the #1 Honor Roll position.



METHODOLOGY FOR RANKING **DATA-DRIVEN SPECIALTIES**

Survival Score:

Patient Safety:



Reputation–Determined by a survey sent to more than 100,000 board-certified specialists asking them to list up to five hospitals that provide the best care, by specialty, for patients who have the most challenging conditions or who need particularly difficult care.

Survival Score-Hospitals were scored from 1 to 10, with 10 indicating the highest survival rate and 1 indicating the lowest rate. **Other Care-Related** Indicators-These include hospital volume, nurse staffing, technology and other resources that define the hospital environment.

Reputation/Physicians Survey: (27.5%)

(Increased from 32.5% to 37.5%)

(Decreased from 10% to 5%)

Other Care-Related Indicators: (30%)

Patient Safety-This score reflects how hard a hospital works to prevent six unwanted occurrences.

U.S. NEWS TO RE-EVALUATE HEALTH SYSTEM SCORING OF **COMMON CARE CONDITIONS**

The Johns Hopkins Hospital was rated by U.S. News to be "high performing" in seven of nine common care areas, except for hip and knee replacement. These procedures are mostly performed at Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center at a much lower cost and similar quality compared with The Johns Hopkins Hospital. U.S. News recognized the need to reconsider how it evaluates health systems that approach care and cost savings in this manner, and it recently noted it would review options for next year's list.
