



Learning While Healing



PROGRAM

When a child has a critical illness, life can become anything but normal. Treatments, hospital stays and doctors' appointments can be stressful all on their own. The thought of a child falling behind in school doesn't need to be added stress for families.

The Suncoast Credit Union Foundation helps fund Patient Academic Services, giving kids access to teachers covering multiple areas throughout the hospital. The Patient Academic Services team connects hospitalized students to the normalcy of school and learning.

By working directly with district teachers to create seamless instruction, students receive lessons at their academic level and are encouraged to grow so they can keep up with their classmates.

"We tailor instructional and academic support to fit patients' and families' needs," explains Kate Loguercio, a patient academic services teacher. "One-on-one instructional support allows us to teach students at their academic level, which encourages growth and success during their admission and beyond."

A Breath of Success

Ariyah had a pretty active and exciting life for a 9-yearold with Down syndrome, asthma, sleep apnea and more, but in December 2018, she came to our Walmart and Sam's Club Emergency Center with difficulty breathing.

Doctors determined she was suffering from walking pneumonia, which was rapidly morphing into a severe lung infection. They put Ariyah on extracorporeal membrane oxygenation (ECMO), which helps circulate the patient's blood through a heart-lung bypass machine to improve oxygen levels.

Through fundraising efforts the Kart 4 Kids Pro-Am Race funded an additional life-saving ECMO machine in 2018. After six days, Ariyah was ready to breathe on her own.

"We were amazed," says Jazmyne, her mother. "He took her off the machines and within an hour she was breathing normally. It's amazing. She's doing so much better now."

Understanding Concussions

Our sports medicine program treated more than 3,000 athletes with concussions in the past five years.

Patrick Mularoni, M.D., medical director of the Pediatric Sports Medicine Program, is conducting a five-year study involving 92 high school athletes to better understand concussions and whether non-concussive hits can cause cumulative damage.

"We're testing them before the season, finding out things about their cognitive function, the way their brain functions—looking at their balance, doing other types of testing on them and then, testing them after the season, and then yearly to see if those things change based upon their participation in sports," Mularoni says.

The study is funded by entrepreneur Bill Edwards and the Hough Family Foundation.

"Physicians in the past 20 years have seen a complete difference in the way concussion management has changed," Mularoni says.

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A Welcome Gift

Letrod was born with X-linked agammaglobulinemia (XLA), a rare genetic disorder that affects the body's ability to fight infection. He started coming to Johns Hopkins All Children's for treatments at 6 weeks old.

Twenty years later, he still comes every three to four weeks from his home in Safety Harbor.

Bridgett was a single mother until Letrod was 16, and she had to quit her job to care for him. Through the On the Spot program, nurses can provide gift cards for gas and groceries, and Bridgett is grateful.

"With us, having to take him down there every month for 20 years, we didn't always have the funds to make it to the appointments and to make it home," she says. "I want to say thank you to the donors. The gift cards take stress off the families. You're already dealing with a sick child and trying to keep faith and be there for your child. The gift cards take stress off: 'OK, I'll be able to feed my family tonight.' Without those gift cards, man, that would be even more stress on us to try to get him there for his appointments. I don't know what we would do if it was not for those gift cards."

Taking Nurses to the Next Level

Naara-Liz Miguez, R.N., seeks to enhance her communication with patients and families and to better collaborate with peers in developing policies based on evidence-based practice. Adam Beard, R.N., B.S.N., gained increased leadership skills, helping him guide other nurses.

Each benefited from the R.N.-B.S.N. Nursing Excellence Scholarship, an education program funded by the Johns Hopkins All Children's Foundation Guild. The Guild raised \$1 million over four years to support nursing excellence.

"Earning my B.S.N. has helped me become a more well-rounded nurse," Beard says. "It has helped me understand nursing from more of a leadership standpoint so I can become a better preceptor to support the new graduate nurses that are also taking care of our patients and families."





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
