## Educational Resource Sheet

New Years Day:Civilizations a round the world have been ce lebrating the start of each new ye ar for at least four millennia. Today, most New Year's festivities begin on December 31 (New Year's Eve), the last day of the Gregorian calendar, a nd continue into the early hours of Ja nuary 1 (New Year's Day). Common traditions include attending parties, eating special New Year's foods, making resolutions for the new year a nd watching fi rewo rks displays.

Martin Luther King Day: Martin Luther King Jr. was a social a ctivist a nd Baptist minister who played a key role in the American ci vil rights movement from the mid-1950s until his assassination in 1968. King sought equality a nd human rights for African Americans, the economically disadvantaged and all victims of injustice through peaceful protest. He was the driving force behind watershed events such as the Montgomery Bus Boycott a nd the 1963 March on Washington, which helped bring about such Iandmark legislation as the Civil Rights Act and the Voting Rights Act. King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 a nd is remembered each year on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, a U.S. federal holiday since 1986.

Memorial Day:Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2023 will occur on Monday, May 29. Ori ginally known as Decoration Day, it origi nated in the years following the Civil War a nd became a n official federal holiday in 1971. Ma ny Americans observe Memorial Day by vis iting ce meteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, it ma rks the beginning of the summer season.

Juneteenth: Juneteenth (short for "June Nineteenth") marks the day when fe deral troops a rrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure that all enslaved people be freed. The troops' a rrival came a full two a nd a half ye ars after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. Juneteenth honors the end to slave ry in the United States and is considered the Iongest-running African American holiday. On June 17, 2021, it officially became a federal holiday.

Confederate General Robert E. Lee had surrendered at Appomattox Court House two months earlier in Virginia, but slavery had rema ined relatively unaffected in Texas-untilU.S. General Gordon Granger stood on Texas soil and read General Orders No. 3: "The people of Texas a re informed that, in a ccordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free."

Independence Day: The Fourth of July-also known as Independence Day or July 4th -has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tra dition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century a nd the American Revolution. On July 2nd, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, a nd two days later delegates from the 13 colonies a dopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. From 1776 to the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from fireworks, para des and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues. The Fourth of July 2023 is on Tuesday, July 4, 2023.

Labor Day: La bor Day 2023 will occur on Monday, September 4. La bor Day pays tribute to the contributions a nd a chievements of Ameri can workers and is traditionally observed on the first Monday in September. It was created by the labor movement in the late 19th century a nd became a federal holiday in 1894. Labor Day weekend also symbolizesthe end of summer for many Ameri cans and is celebrated with parties, street parades and athletic events

Thanksgiving Day: Tha nksgiving Day is a national holiday in the United States, and Thanksgiving 2023 occurs on Thursday, Nove mber 24. In 1621, the Plymouth colonists and the Wampanoag shared an autumn harvest feast that is a cknowledged as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the colonies. For more than two centuries, days of thanksgiving we re celebrated by
individual colonies and states. It wasn't until 1863, in the midst of the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln a nationa I Thanksgiving Day to be held each November.

## Winter Holiday (Christmas, Kwanza, and Hanukkah during this holiday):

- Christmas is ce lebrated on December 25 and is both a s acred religious holiday a nd a worldwide cultural and commercial phenomenon. For two millennia, people around the world have been observing it with tra ditions a nd practices that are both re ligious a nd secular in nature. Christians ce lebrate Christmas Day as the annive rsary of the birth of Jesus of Nazareth, a spiritual leader whose teachings form the basis of their religion. Popular customs include exchanging gifts, decorating Christmas trees, attending church, sharing meals with family a nd friends and, of course, waiting for Santa Claus to a rrive. De cember 25-Christmas Day—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1870.
- Kwanzaa History: Dr. Ma ulana Ka renga, professor and chairman of Black Studies at California State University, Long Beach, created Kwanzaain 1966. After the Watts riots in Los Angeles, Dr. Ka renga searched for ways to bring African Ameri cans together a s a community. He founded US, a cultural organization, a nd started to research African "first fruit" (harvest) ce lebrations. Ka renga combined aspects of several different harvest celebrations, such as those of the As ha nti and th ose of the Zulu, to form the basis of the week-long holiday. Kwa nzaa 2023 will take place December 26, 2023, through January 1, 2024.
- Hanukkah History: The eight-day Jewish celebration known as Hanukkah or Chanukah commemorates the rededication during the second century B.C. of the Second Te mple in Je rusalem, where according to legend Jews had ris en up a gainst their Greek-Syrian oppressors in the Maccabean Revolt. Hanukkah, which means "dedication" in Hebrew, begins on the 25th of Kislev on the Hebrew ca lendar a nd usually falls in November or December. Hanukkah 2023 begins on the evening of December 7 a nd ends on the evening of December 15. Often called the Festival of Lights, the holiday is ce lebrated with the lighting of the menorah, tra ditional foods, games a nd gifts.
