Johns Hopkins School of Medicine Graduate Programs – Admissions Information for the PhD in **Pathobiology**

Program Admissions Details:

In 2023, the Pathobiology PhD Program admitted 9 students out of a pool of 127 applicants. In August 2023, the total number of students in the program was 36. The average time to degree for this program is 5.6 years. Students in this program work on the East Baltimore campus.

Students in this program are paid a stipend to support their living expenses (the 2023-2024 stipend is \$37,600). Tuition costs for SOM courses are covered by the School for students in this Program (i.e., not paid by the student). Standard medical, dental and eye benefits for the student are covered. Benefits for the student's immediate family are available at additional cost to the student. Student stipends are subject to taxes. Students from Maryland with student loans may receive State tax benefits. More information is available on our <u>Financial Aid page</u>. The University does not provide housing, though the housing office will provide advice.

Some students in this program are covered by Federal training grants. Others applied for individual scholarships and received funding. Applicants are encouraged (but not required) to apply for funding before beginning their training. The Vivien Thomas Scholars Initiative (VTSI) is a newly endowed fellowship program at Johns Hopkins for PhD students in STEM fields. It provides full tuition, stipend, and benefits while also providing targeted mentoring, networking, community, and professional development opportunities. Students who have attended a historically black college and university (HBCU) or other minority serving institution (MSI) for undergraduate study are eligible to apply. To be considered for the VTSI, all application and supplementary materials must be received by **December 1, 2023**. More information about the VTSI program is available here.

Program Details:

The Graduate Program in Pathobiology holds its recruitment in mid-January. The application for this program is open from 9/1/2023 to 12/2/2023. Applicants may begin and submit anytime during this period. It is beneficial to begin the process early in order to ensure timely submission of Letters of Recommendation. The application and related materials can only be submitted in the period when the application is open.

On the application, Applicants are asked to indicate the research area(s) of interest from this list:

- Immunopathology
- Microbiology & Infectious Disease
- Neoplasia
- Neuropathology
- Vascular Biology & Hemostasis

Academic History & Prior Research Experience:

Applicants will need to list all colleges and universities they attended. An unofficial transcript will need to be uploaded from each school attended. Applicants with prior research experience share information

about this including the institution and mentor, dates of participation, and any publications resulting from the experience.

Admissions requirements:

- Our program requires applicants to submit a Curriculum Vitae (C.V.). This can be updated after
 the application is submitted, provided the updates are completed before the graduate
 program's deadline.
- Applicants must submit a **one to two-page maximum personal statement** indicating the basis of their interest in graduate study and their career objectives. Applicants should include a discussion of any research experience they have had.
- Applicants must identify three people who are familiar with the applicant's work and provide
 contact info for these references. The contact info will be entered into the application, and SOM
 will contact the references and ask them to submit letters of recommendation on behalf of the
 applicant.
- Applicants are NOT required to take the GRE for this program. Our program does not require the GRE General or Subject Tests, however if taken, applicants are able to submit their scores. Applicants wishing to submit scores should request that they be sent directly to the University, using the GRE Institution Code: 5316. Submitted scores from the GRE must be received before the Admissions application deadline for this program (12/2/2023). If scores were not directed to Johns Hopkins University or Johns Hopkins School of Medicine at the time the test was taken, the applicant should contact the College Board and have their scores sent to the Institution code: 5316. Again, applicants are NOT required to take the GRE for this program.

International Students:

- The University will sponsor visas for accepted students.
- International students whose native language is not English are required to complete the Test of
 English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or International English Language Testing System (IELTS).
 When taking the exam, applicants should request official scores be reported to Institution Code
 5316 (the Department Code is not necessary). To report official IELTS test scores, please include
 the Test Report Form (TRF) verification number on the application. Scores must be received
 before the application deadline.
- The TOEFL requirement will be waived if the applicant has completed their degree in a U.S. institution or English-speaking institution, or is currently enrolled and will receive a degree from a university within the U.S. or English-speaking institution prior to matriculation at JHU-SOM.
- All transcripts, letters of recommendation, and parts of the Admissions application must be in English. The approved transcript service for use by international students is <u>WES</u>.
- International students are not eligible for waivers of the Admissions Application fees.

Getting to know you:

Parts of the Admissions application collect information for mandatory reporting. These parts
may ask applicants to select a pre-set category for gender, race or ethnicity. Other sections of
the application allow applicants to share more details about how they choose to describe
themselves.

Application Fee waivers may be given to applicants based on family income (U.S. citizens only).
 The term family is determined by your definition. Families may involve adoptions, separations, and many other variations.

Admissions fees:

- An admissions fee of \$115 dollars is required and must be submitted using a credit card. *You may apply to up to four School of Medicine programs with no additional fee.*
- Application fee waivers are available to prospective students who meet eligibility criteria <u>found</u> <u>here</u>. U.S or Permanent Resident applicants will be prompted in the application to provide supporting information. If you are an international applicant, email the Office of Graduate Biomedical Education (OGBE) at <u>Gradadmissions@jhmi.edu</u> with your supporting information to receive the waiver. All documents will be reviewed and verified. You may contact the OGBE with any questions.

Application status website:

 Once their application is submitted, applicants may follow its progress on the Application Status page. This page can be accessed upon completion of the application. The status page has the most current information.

Admission timeline:

- Review of applications occurs before and after the application deadline. The Graduate Program
 in Pathobiology reviews applications as they are received, submitting your application before
 the deadline is encouraged and will aid in our overall review process.
- Pathobiology will contact strong applicants about interviews in mid-December. In some cases, interviews may be conducted over Skype/Zoom (or similar services). Pathobiology provides travel scheduling, hotel accommodations, and meals throughout an applicant's visit to the Baltimore campus. The Program will also reimburse mileage costs for personal travel by car for those applicants traveling within driving range of Baltimore for their interviews. Interviews for this program will occur the weekend of January 11th 13th, 2024.
- Letters describing acceptance, wait list status, or rejection will be sent via email. This
 information will also be available on the Application status website. Applicants selected for
 acceptance must choose to accept or reject the offer by April 15, 2024. On April 15, all accepted
 offers become binding.
- Orientation will be held on the third week of August 2024. Students will begin their training at
 this time. The Pathobiology program only accepts students for fall matriculation. Early
 matriculation dates are typically available in early July, should an accepted students choose to
 do a summer rotation.

Applicant survey:

Applicants will receive a survey during the third week of April (after April 15) where they can
provide feedback about their experience with the Admissions process. The survey will also ask
questions about the disability status of applicants.

Upon acceptance:

- Accepted students will undergo a criminal background check.
- Accepted students must submit official transcripts to the School of Medicine Registrar. This may
 be in the form of a digital transcript, which is submitted through a transcript service approved
 by the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine Registrar. The approved transcript service for
 international students is <u>WES</u>. Transcripts may also be mailed directly from the Accepted
 student's school to the School of Medicine Registrar. Detailed instructions will be provided
 upon acceptance.
