In an 1873 letter from Mr. Johns Hopkins to the trustees, directing them to establish a hospital and medical school:

"It will be your duty to provide for the erection upon other ground, of suitable building ... You will provide for the reception of a limited number of patients who are able to make compensation ... The money received from such persons will enable you to appropriate a larger sum for the relief of the sufferings of that class which I direct you to admit free of charge and you will thus be enabled to afford to strangers and to those of our people who have no friends or relatives to care for them in sickness ... the advantage of careful and skillful treatment ...

It is my especial request that the influence of religion shall be felt in and impressed upon the whole management of the Hospital; but I desire, nevertheless, that the administration of the charity shall by undisturbed by sectarian influence, discipline or control."

We take our mission from this letter—to be the embodiment of faith and hope, inclusive and respectful of all religious and spiritual traditions with Johns Hopkins' patients, families, staff members, faculty members and students, and with our congregational medical-religious partners throughout Baltimore.



R.I.S.E. – Resilience in Stressful Events

R.I.S.E. is a peer-responder program that provides "psychological first aid and emotional support" to health care professionals following difficult events. R.I.S.E. peer responders provide skilled, nonjudgmental and confidential support to individuals and groups. Rev. Matt Norvell, pediatric chaplain at JHH, and his colleagues implemented R.I.S.E. programs and trained peer responders at Howard County Medical Center, Baltimore Washington Medical Center, Union Memorial (Elkton, Maryland), Parkland Hospital (Dallas, Texas), Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital (St. Petersburg, Florida), King Abdulaziz Medical City Ministry of National Guard Health Affairs (Saudi Arabia), St. Jude Children's Research Hospital (Memphis, Tennessee) and Gwinnett Health System (Atlanta, Georgia).


Memorial Services

Spiritual Care and Chaplaincy provided 185 memorial services in 2018, including services for individuals at the department level as well as larger institutional services. On May 17, 470 people attended The Johns Hopkins Sidney Kimmel Comprehensive Cancer Center's Service of Remembrance, held in the center's lobby. Cancer Survivor Day, held June 10 in the Weinberg Building, was attended by 275 guests and featured a survivor fashion show, musical guests, an inspirational speaker and refreshments. On Oct. 13, 260 people attended the Kimmel Cancer Center's survivorship conference at the BWI Airport Marriott. Cancer survivors adn caregivers from many different treatment centers in the area attended this donor-supported, half-day conference free of charge.

More than 400 parents, loved ones and staff members attended the Children's Tribute Service at Johns Hopkins Children's Center on April 11, and there was a service of remembrance for perinatal loss in April. At Johns Hopkins Bayview, approximately 90 people attended a memorial service in early December.





Improve the Quality and Affordability of Health Care

Grants

Maryland Department of Health Advance Directive Education and Outreach Grant - \$35,000

The Department of Spiritual Care and Chaplaincy and the Healthy Community Partnership at Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center have partnered to provide advance directive education to the central region of Maryland.

TKF Foundation Grant - \$6,000

The TFK Foundation funded two incredible projects on Johns Hopkins Bayview's outdoor labyrinth. They awarded \$5,000 for the development of a new memorial garden and \$1,000 for a summer yoga series on the labyrinth.

Foundation for Spirituality and Medicine - \$25,000

The Foundation for Spirituality and Medicine awarded Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center \$25,000 for an Aliki chaplain position. The goal of the Aliki initiative is for each doctor to spend more time with each patient and make some home visits to create a holistic, custom-tailored care plan. The Aliki chaplain provides spiritual care services and is an integrated chaplaincy presence on the Aliki team.

Episcopal Grant - \$15,000

The Episcopal Church Foundation awarded Johns Hopkins and the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland \$15,000 to establish medical-religious partnerships between Johns Hopkins and four local Episcopal congregations, with a possibility of extending the grant by \$20,000 over the next two years.

Pyramid Grant - \$1,000

The Pyramid Grant funded a bereavement project at Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center, which has been used as a tool for patient/family engagement, honoring the death and dying process, and ritualizing the moment.

ACPE Innovation Grant - \$10,000

ACPE, Inc. awarded Johns Hopkins \$10,000 toward development of the Caring for the Peacemakers clinical pastoral education program, a partnership of the Baltimore City Police Department Community Chaplaincy with Johns Hopkins Spiritual Care and Chaplaincy.
