Arthur Kleinman, MD



Arthur Kleinman is professor of medical anthropology and psychiatry at Harvard Medical School. He is the Esther and Sidney Rabb professor of anthropology in the Department of Anthropology in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences (FAS), and was director of Harvard University's Asia Center 2008 - 2016. Dr. Kleinman is a leading figure in medical anthropology, cultural psychiatry, global health, social medicine, and medical humanities. A China scholar, since 1978, he has conducted research in China, and in Taiwan from 1969 until 1978. He is a member of the National Academy of Medicine and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He has published numerous books including most recently *The Soul of Care: The Moral Education of a Husband and a Doctor*, published by Viking/Penguin in September 2019.

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Louise Aronson



Louise Aronson is a geriatrician, writer, educator, and professor of medicine at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF) and the author of the New York Times bestseller *Elderhood: Redefining Aging, Transforming Medicine, and Reimagining Life*. A graduate

of Harvard Medical School and the Warren Wilson Program for Writers, Dr. Aronson has received the Gold Professorship in Humanism in Medicine, the California Homecare Physician of the Year award, and the American Geriatrics Society Clinician-Teacher of the Year award. Her writing appears in publications including *The New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *Discover Magazine*, and *The New England Journal of Medicine* and has earned her four Pushcart nominations, the Sonora Review Prize, and a MacDowell fellowship. Her work has been featured on CBS *This Morning*, NPR's *Fresh Air*, Politico, LitHub, Kaiser Health News, and Tech Nation.

Salvatore Mangione, MD



Salvatore Mangione, MD, is a clinician-educator with a long interest in physical diagnosis, medical history, community service and the role of the humanities in medicine. His innovative programs and engaging teaching style have been recognized by multiple teaching awards, and his work has

been featured in *The New York Times*, *The Los Angeles Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, the BBC, CNN, NPR, and *Forbes*. Dr. Mangione has been an invited speaker at many national and international meetings, especially in regard to using visual arts to teach bedside observation. He is the author of the book *Secrets in Physical Diagnosis*.

Stephen J. Spann, MD



Stephen J. Spann, a family physician leader, educator and researcher, is the Founding Dean of the College of Medicine and Vice-President for Medical Affairs at the University of Houston; which will focus on primary care, community and population health, and care of the underserved.

He has served as a consultant to medical schools, residency programs, ministries of health, and health care delivery systems in many countries, focusing on primary care training program and clinical practice development and implementation. From 2012 to 2015, he served as Chief Medical Officer of Tawam Hospital, a 460 bed tertiary care teaching facility in Al Ain, United Arab Emirates managed by Johns Hopkins Medicine International, and as senior advisor on primary care and academic affairs to SEHA, the Abu Dhabi Health Services Company.

John Harley Warner, Ph.D.



John Harley Warner, Ph.D., is the Avalon Professor and Chair of History of Medicine at the Yale University School of Medicine, and at Yale he is also Professor of History, American Studies, and History of Science and Medicine. He teaches graduate, medical, and undergraduate students. His research focuses on science and medicine from the late-eighteenth century through the present, particularly professional identity, education, clinical practice, the visual cultures of medicine, and transnational comparison. Books include *The Therapeutic Perspective*, *Against the Spirit of System*, *Dissection*, *Major Problems in the History of American Medicine*, *Locating Medical History*, and *Translating the Body*. His current research centers on a book tentatively titled *The Quest for Authenticity in Modern Medicine*, which traces anxieties about what was being marginalized, lost, or placed at risk of being lost with the late-nineteenth century emergence of a new version of reductionist, laboratory-based scientific medicine, and maneuvers of selective return and restoration through the present.
