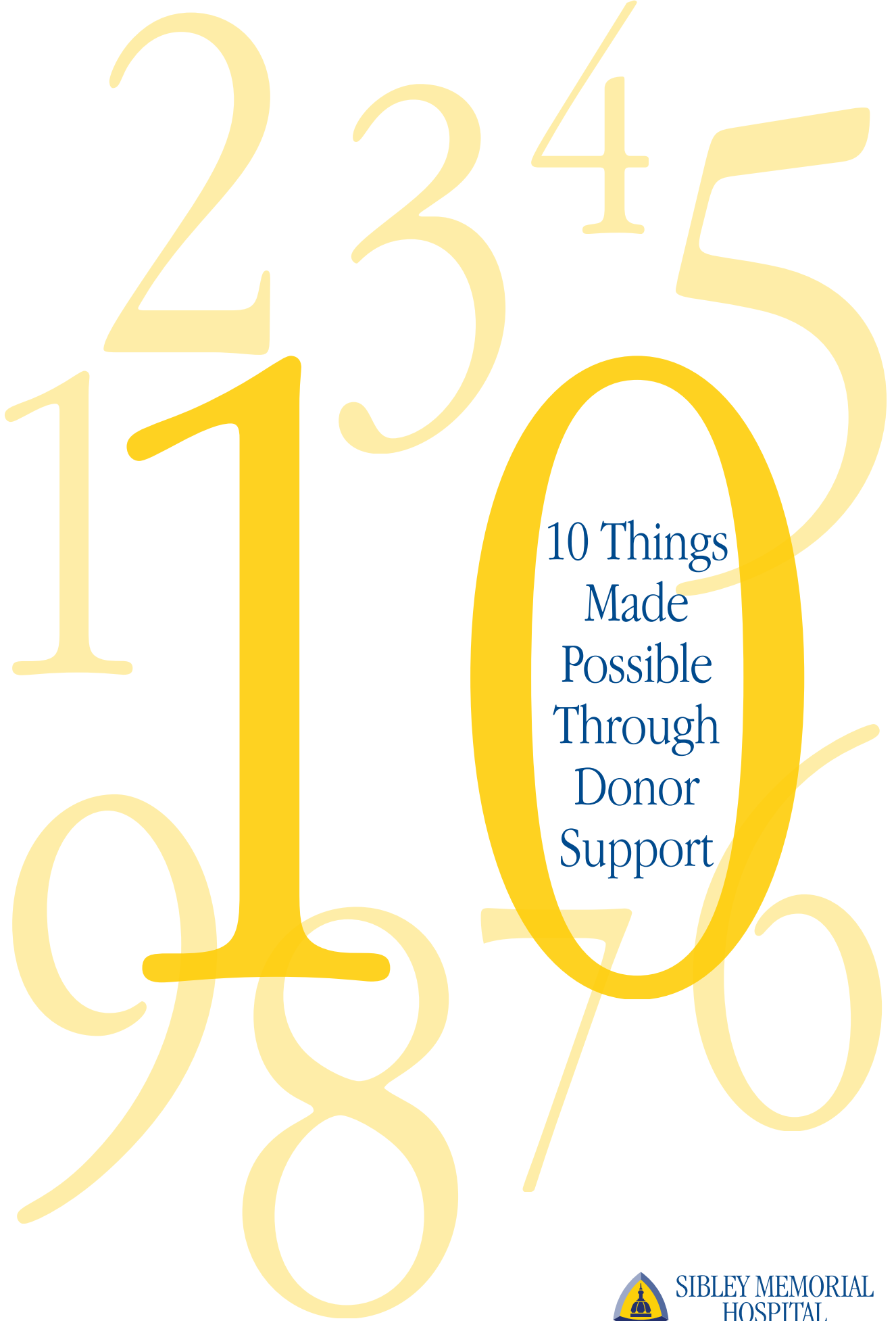

MORE THAN 900 PATIENTS TREATED AT THE NEW JOHNS HOPKINS SIDNEY KIMMEL CANCER CENTER AT SIBLEY

Made possible through the generous philanthropic support of the Clark Charitable Foundation and others, the new Johns Hopkins Kimmel Cancer Center at Sibley opened in September 2016.

The Center brings the future of cancer care to our community, with leading-edge technology, clinical research trials, and Johns Hopkins faculty and specialists to diagnose and treat cancer on Sibley's campus.

The new Center allows a team of experts to collaborate and develop the most effective plan for each patient. The space includes a dedicated inpatient oncology floor with

The medical oncology program at the Johns Hopkins Kimmel Cancer Center at Sibley cares for more than 150 patients each day.

CANCER CARE IN WASHINGTON**

The Kimmel Cancer Center at Sibley is also home to our pediatric radiation oncology program in collaboration with the Children’s National Health System—the **1st** program of its kind in the Washington, D.C. region.

The Sibley Memorial Hospital Foundation’s Young Professionals Board (YPB) holds the annual Sibley Soirée to support hospital programs. In 2016 and 2017, these young leaders focused their efforts on Sibley’s pediatric radiation oncology program, raising more than \$300,000 to help our pediatric patients. Thank you!

**MORE THAN 400 BABIES TREATED IN
THE SILBERMAN FAMILY SPECIAL CARE NURSERY**

Donor support makes extraordinary care possible. Thanks to a generous contribution by The Robert and Christina Silberman Charitable Trust, Sibley Hospital’s new Special Care Nursery opened in 2016, with **18** private rooms, including six rooms for twins. The nursery is equipped with advanced mobile and central fetal monitoring. Round-the-clock neonatologists and neonatal nurses not only care for babies, but also provide emotional support and education for parents.

47 NURSES RECEIVED SPECIALTY CERTIFICATIONS

Nurses are the front line of care at Sibley, and an investment in nursing education and training has a direct impact on patients. As part of our commitment to providing the best care possible, Sibley is pursuing Magnet Recognition designation, the gold standard in nursing excellence. To reach this goal, we are working to increase the number of nurses on staff with specialty certifications. Donor support helps alleviate the financial responsibility of additional training for our dedicated nurses who pursue certifications. In 2017, 47 Sibley nurses received specialty certifications, for a total of more than

170 direct-care nurses at the hospital with a range of specialties.

SIMULATION TRAINING TO PRACTICE EMERGENCY MEDICINE

"Joey's been coughing and breathing fast," said his mom. "He has developmental delays, so he doesn't talk. He vomited once. I just feel like I should have you guys take a look at him." The R.N. connects Joey to a monitor and the team swings into action.

Fortunately, Joey wasn't in real danger. Joey is a "SimMan" pediatric manikin used for training. Support from William Ritchie allows Sibley's Emergency Department (ED) to hold regular simulation training sessions for nurses and physicians, led by staff from Johns Hopkins Medicine. These simulated emergency scenarios challenge clinical staff to think critically, work quickly, and collaborate as a team—ultimately leading to improved patient care and outcomes. Last year, a gift from Rory and Shelton Zuckerman allowed the ED to purchase an adult SimMan so the team can carry out both pediatric and adult scenarios. "We are so fortunate to have this program which helps us better prepare to care for patients from one week to 100 years old," says Laura Kinsella, B.S.N., R.N., C.E.N., and Sibley's pediatric simulation coordinator.

In 2017, Sibley's Emergency Department was one of only 22 hospitals nationwide to win the coveted Lantern Award from the Emergency Nurses Association for excellence and innovation in leadership, practice, education, advocacy, and research.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR THOSE IN NEED

Funded entirely through philanthropy, Sibley's Center for Patient and Family Services (CPFS) provides expert help for patients living with cancer, addressing their social, emotional, spiritual, and practical needs. Last year CPFS provided more than **\$260,000**

in financial assistance for prescriptions, transportation, and other costs for oncology patients in need. Donor support also allows CPFS to offer free weekly yoga and meditation classes for cancer patients, survivors, and family members, to help address physical and emotional challenges related to cancer treatment and survivorship. Your support also helped CPFS hire two additional social workers last year.

COMPASSIONATE CARE FOR PEOPLE IN PAIN

Sibley's new orthopaedic unit includes the **Morris and Gwendolyn Cafritz Foundation Clinic**—an innovative rehabilitation clinic, fully equipped for every aspect of orthopaedic recovery to help restore quality-of-life for people with musculoskeletal pain. The physical therapy treatment area includes an advanced motorized gait system, allowing patients to safely practice walking and regain their balance, and the occupational therapy area allows recovering patients to practice household tasks and self-care.

VITAL EXERCISE CLASSES FOR MOVEMENT DISORDERS

Sibley's rehabilitation team offered **free exercise classes for Parkinson's patients** in the community, in partnership with Iona Senior Services. These classes are an integral part of care for people with Parkinson's, helping slow progression of the disease and improving quality-of-life.

How your Support Made Excellence and Compassionate Care Possible in 2017

Our donors help the hospital provide the best care possible to our community by supporting lifesaving new technologies, innovative programs and therapies for patients, and continuing education for our dedicated health care providers. Here are a few other ways donors like you made a difference in the last year:

- With generous support from donors, Sibley's orthopaedics program purchased **18 vital signs machines** to monitor and record patients' vital signs for use in patient rooms. Having a machine in each room eliminates the need for nurses to bring the machines from another area, saving valuable staff time.
- Donors helped us provide **toys for Sibley's pediatric radiation oncology** play room in our new child-friendly space.
- Your support provides critical **stroke recognition** training for staff, and helped our Emergency Department purchase a lightweight gurney and a new scale for use with stroke patients, so they can get an accurate weight for administering tPA—a clot-busting stroke drug that must be administered quickly.
- With your help, we enrolled 52 nurses in Sibley's **nurse residency program**, which provides additional training and support to newly graduated nurses, with an emphasis on leadership development, communication, patient safety, and career planning.
